About the What if...? Process

It is by asking *What if?* that we start imagining what we can do instead of what we can't do - which is how we create powerful meaningful solutions.

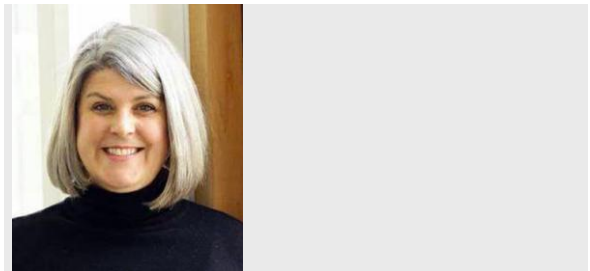

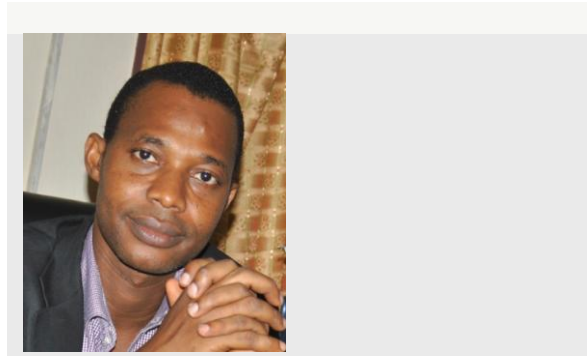
